Q & A with the artist, composers, and performers

ERIK BRANCH is a native of New York City, and received a BA and MA in Music (Composition) from Hunter College. He lives near Orlando, Florida, where he is active as a pianist, musical director, composer/arranger, operatic tenor, and actor on stage and screen.

When I first heard about this project and saw Sinuhé Vega's fascinating work, I immediately wanted to participate. The instrumental combination interested me intensely. A particular draw was hearing my music sung once again by Anna Eschbach's lush, brilliant voice. I also immediately thought of my friend and collaborator, the gifted Logan Anderson, to write the text. I have tried to both express the words and depict and depict the magical, dreamlike, vibrant world of Vega's work.

(A note from Mr. Anderson:)

"I was inspired by Sinuhé Vega's artwork and philosophy our interactions with the natural world. Connecting with other artists via iterations of creativity was a catalyst. With the writing of poetry for a 'silent conversation' and articulating the continuation of the human cravings for nature, there arose 'There Was Always Time.'"



ALEX BURTZOS is an American composer, conductor, and educator based in New York City and Orlando, FL, whose music has been performed across four continents by some of the world's foremost contemporary musicians and ensembles. Alex is the founder and Artistic Director of ICEBERG New Music, a New York-based composer collective, and the endowed chair of composition studies at the University of Central Florida. His music is published by Just a Theory Press, NewMusicShelf, and others, and can be heard on the Sono Luminous and Ravello Records labels.

Dr. **NATE CHIVERS** is a composer/guitarist and arranger based in Kissimmee, FL. He holds a PhD in composition from the Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester, UK. He is currently working on compositions for 15-tone guitar in addition to works bridging pop and classical styles.



Soprano **ANNA ESCHBACH** is an active performer and private voice instructor in the

Central Florida area. She earned her bachelor's degree in vocal performance from

Appalachian State University and a master's degree in vocal performance from the

University of Tennessee. Born and raised in Orlando, Ms. Eschbach has performed with

numerous professional organizations throughout Florida, including Opera Orlando, the Brevard Symphony Orchestra, The Villages Philharmonic, Orlando Sings, and the Bach Festival Society of Winter Park. Known for her work in oratorio, Ms. Eschbach's reputable canon of repertoire as soprano soloist includes Handel's Messiah, Haydn's The Creation, Orff's Carmina Burana, and Fauré's

Requiem among many others. She is a founding member of notable Central Florida professional ensembles including Bach Vocal Artists, Solaria Singers, and Helena. Currently, Ms. Eschbach maintains a thriving private voice studio and performing career throughout the Orlando area, and serves on the voice faculty at Rollins College.



TROY GIFFORD is a composer and guitarist whose music synthesizes elements of modern classical, Latin, jazz, and rock styles. His compositions have been performed around the world, including at festivals and concerts in North America, South America, Europe, and Asia. He has won a number of awards for his music, including first prize in competitions sponsored by the Guitar Foundation of America, Fingerstyle Guitar Magazine, and the University of Miami. He is a regularly featured contributor for Fingerstyle Guitar Journal, one of the premier publications for fingerstyle guitarists.

Dr. Gifford holds graduate degrees from Florida Atlantic University and the University of Miami. He currently serves as the chair of the music program at Valencia College in Orlando.



CHARLIE GRIFFIN is an accomplished composer, educator, and arts administrator with a distinguished thirty-year career. His music has been performed in over twenty countries, featuring at prestigious venues like Carnegie Hall, the Kennedy Center, and international festivals including Spoleto and Aspen. Notable performances include collaborations with the St. Louis Symphony and Orlando Philharmonic.

A versatile creative professional, Griffin has lectured at renowned institutions like Hofstra University and Columbia University and internationally at U.S. Embassies in Latvia and Lithuania. In 2010, he helped launch Full Sail University's Music Production program and, shortly after, founded the Central Florida Composers Forum. Beyond

music, Griffin explores creativity through improv, acting, and creative writing.



GALEN KAUP requested a "little violin" before his second birthday, and it actually arrived at 2 years, 2 months of age. He holds a BM from the Crane School of Music at SUNY Potsdam, a BS in Mathematics from Clarkson University, master's degrees in violin and math from IU Bloomington, and a doctorate in strings from FSU. When not playing the violin, he hosts and DMs a D&D campaign, prints and paints monster miniatures in 1:60 scale for said campaign, lines button and dance mat presses up with flashing arrows, and attempts to grow his hot pepper plants to the point of a decent sized harvest.



GERALD LAW II is a composer based in the Central Florida area. Law's approach brings a unique sound driven by his background as a drummer and cellist, combining rhythm and melody in an inspiring way. His recent work includes music written for Henry Severe's short film, 'Delusionally, Ari'.

Reflection is a valuable tool in our search for progress. As we look inward, it is also our perspective on the world around us that compliments our growth. This piece is inspired by the conversation with self. What is our contribution? Are we helping or hurting those around us? Who do we want to be? The mirror is often where those questions can be met with honesty. Nature, in this case, serves as our reflector.



PAUL AUSTIN SANDERS earned a BA in Vocal Performance from Western Washington University. He has premiered a wide variety of music with CF2. Paul belongs to IATSE Local 835, has performed at Disney, is a studio voice-over artist, as well as a guitarist and bassist who's performed in many groups.

Ideally, we should, and could be connected to nature... Over time, with over-industrialization...that connection is being more and more lost...go down any street and see how many sterile lawns you see...compared to those with raised bed gardens. But a more sustainable consciousness is evolving...and those who choose to live closer to nature are reawakening that connection...I reflect on the importance

of that connection and its potential...but what has unfolded? We have lost our way...the sadness of natural areas decimated to make way for a new suburb is in this music. There are moments of fluid movement where the violin and guitar are connected more, as we should be with nature, and at times there is this tension... when humanity is not... Perhaps at one point we will all understand and fully return to nature...

In this duet for violin and guitar...the only words will be the thoughts of the listeners...



NICK SCOUT is a multi-instrumentalist whose foundation is rooted in stringed instrument, with a style that encompasses everything from Gypsy jazz to neo-soul, classical to country-western, Hindustani to punk. Scout marries emotion with lawless fantasia in an approach all his own.

Upon seeing works from Sinuhe Vega's Future Nature, I was forced to reflect upon my relationship with Mother Nature. Although usually pessimistic in thought, my path led me face to face with shortcomings in my link to the earth. I started and finished this piece on a return flight from Ireland to the US- where the majority of my time was spent engulfed by the natural environment. My soul had me asking for forgiveness from the earth for participating

in harmful societal norms, and I realized I can only *truly* give back and ask for forgiveness upon my passing- where I can no longer take, but fully contribute to nature's healing process. Note this by the absence of voice on the last pass through the song.
